ABOUT THE AUDIT

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the City of Ferndale for the period from January 1, 2009, through December 31, 2009.

We evaluated internal controls and performed audit procedures on the activities of the City. We also determined whether the City complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of noncompliance, misappropriation or misuse. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Hotline referrals:
 - police department/library construction
 - council actions
- Safeguarding of assets

- Payroll
- Manual warrants
- Court receipting/adjustments
- Open Public Meetings Act

RESULTS

In most areas, the City complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures. However, we noted certain matters that we communicated to City management. We appreciate the City's commitment to resolving those matters.
