## **ACTIVITIES COMPLETED IN 2013**

In fiscal year 2013, the Transportation Benefit District (TBD) generated \$355,553. Two projects were completed using TBD funds in 2013, as outlined below.

**Thornton Road (Maureen Drive to Vista)** This project included reconstruction of 1,000 feet of roadway, new sidewalks, sanitary sewer system, stormwater system, waterline improvements, a bus pullout and a right turn lane on to Vista Drive. Construction was completed in early fall 2013. In addition to the funding from the TBD, the City obtained \$1.05M in grant funds from the U.S. Department of Transportation's Highway Surface Transportation Program. A summary of project expenditures is shown below.

Vista Drive (Second Avenue to Shuksan Street) This project included grinding and overlaying the existing pavement, repair of failed roadway sections, installation of ADA compliant ramps where needed, as well as replacement of an aged sewer line between Third Avenue and the Malloy Avenue roundabout. Construction was completed in early fall 2013. In addition to the funding from the TBD, the City obtained a \$518,500 grant from the Washington State Transportation Improvement Board's Arterial Preservation Program. The City's utility funds covered costs associated with the various utility improvements. A summary of project expenditures is shown below.

The available cash balance at the end of the 2013 fiscal year was \$238,204.

### **ACTIVITIES ANTICIPATED FOR 2014**

An additional \$360,000 in anticipated revenue is forecasted to be received in 2014. At the close of 2013, the attached TBD project list identified two projects for construction in 2014:

Church Road (Main Street to Heather Drive) This project includes reconstructing and widening the roadway to include curb, gutter, sidewalks, two vehicle travel lanes and two bike lanes, installation of a new sanitary sewer system, a new stormwater system and waterline improvements. Construction is anticipated to begin in spring 2014. The total project construction cost is estimated at \$4M, which will be funded utilizing nearly \$3 million in grant funding via a \$800,000 state grant from the Transportation Improvement Board and \$1.98 million federal grant from the Surface Transportation Program. Additional funding will be provided through the TBD, as well as the City's utility funds.

**Barrett Road (Smith Road to Main Street)** This project includes an asphalt overlay of approximately 5,800 linear feet of roadway and installation of new pedestrian ramps that meet ADA compliance. Construction is anticipated to begin in summer 2014. The total project construction cost is estimated at \$410,000. Costs will be covered by utilizing TBD funds and a \$379,000 Transportation Improvement Board state grant.

# A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF FERNDALE TRANSPORTATION BENEFIT DISTRICT, FERNDALE, WASHINGTON, ADOPTING THE ANNUAL STREET PLAN LIST

**WHEREAS**, the City of Ferndale (the "City") approved Ordinance No. 1686 on November 21, 2011, establishing the Ferndale Transportation Benefit District ("District") pursuant to RCW 36.73; and

**WHEREAS**, the District received voter approval to impose a sales and use tax upon the occurrence of any taxable event within the boundaries of the District to fund transportation improvements; and


**WHEREAS**, the District's adopted list of projects is based on the City's 6year Transportation Improvement Program, a list that is updated annually; and
